PASTOR'S COLUMN

Summer Solstice and Solemnity

June is a great month for all sorts of celestial or heavenly events. This past Monday we had a rare occurrence of a full moon coinciding with the Summer Solstice. The solstice marks the shortest night of the year for the northern hemisphere and the official beginning of summer. God, the consummate poet, chose this time of year to bring to the world's stage the last prophet to precede the Messiah, St. John the Baptist. Although not exactly falling on the Summer Solstice, June 20, the Nativity of John the Baptist, June 25, has long been associated with this cyclic solar event. It was documented as an official day of rest and liturgical celebration in 506 by the council of Agde, France. Similar to Christmas, it was celebrated with three Masses - vigil, dawn and midday.

For the last prophet to be born six months before the Savior of the World, at the time of the Solstice, is spiritually significant as it points to the "fullness of time" spoken about in Paul's Letter to the Galatians, Chapter 4: 4-5: "But when the time had fully come, God sent forth His Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons." The world was as full or prepared as it could be for the Messiah. The time was right because, thru the spread of Greek philosophy, art and culture, as well as, Roman order, the world had done its best without Christ. The truth and love of Jesus could then serve as the crowning achievement for God. This is a great example of the theological principle: grace builds on nature. Furthermore, with the Jews having spread throughout the empire, they seeded the Roman world with the Law and the Prophets.

That the days are now getting shorter also marks how St. John the Baptist must decrease so that Jesus might increase. The spiritual meaning is that we must grow in humility in order to let Christ grow in importance in our lives. We have six months to decrease in our own self-importance so as to more readily and fully welcome Christ into our lives!
